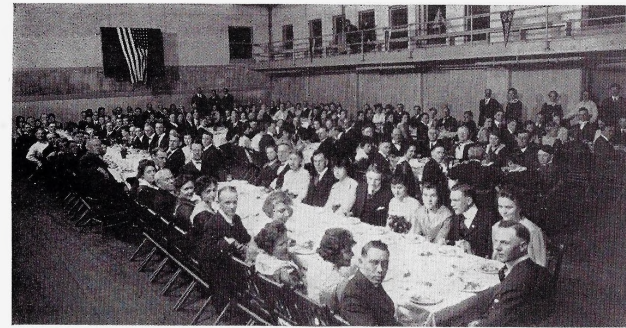
Let us be right, though all the world may follow
